

# Cold Hardy Palms

Below is a list of cold hardy palms, and the minimum temperatures that they will tolerate. Lady Palm (some sp.)	20°F	3gal. – B&B
Needle Palm	-20°F	3gal. – 30gal.
Paurotis Palm	20-25°F	B&B
Pindo Palm	12-15°F	15gal. – B&B
Pygmy Date Palm	20°F	3gal. – B&B
Queen Palm	20°F	15gal. – B&B
Ribbon Palm	20°F	15gal. – B&B
Saw Palmetto	-10°F	3gal. – 30gal.
Sabal Palm	10°F	B&B
Washingtonia robusta	18°F	15gal. – B&B
Windmill Palm	5°F	7gal. – B&B
